Total of 48 species plus one race (Oregon Junco) on Count Day. Four additional species were observed during Count Week, giving a total of 52 species for Count Week. Total individuals = 4290.

Observers: 24 observers in field in 11 parties, plus 9 observers at feeders only. **Time and Distance**: 14 hours at feeders; 4.25 hours and 63 miles owling. Total party-hours = 58.75 and total party miles = 764.75 (9.75 hours and 7.75 miles on foot; 49 hours and 757 miles by car).

Weather: Low and high temperatures were -14 and 0 deg Fahrenheit. Winds were westerly, in the range of 4-12 mph throughout the day. No precipitation. Sunny skies.

Conditions: Snow depth = 4 inches. Excellent crop of crabapples and a very good crop of Mountain Ash berries. The cone crop was poor. Open water only where flowing water, mainly below dams on the Red River and the English Coulee. Also a small area at the Grand Forks lagoons and springs in Kellys Slough.

Comments:

This was the 45th consecutive year for this count in the present location. Hermit Thrush and Golden Eagle (count week) were new species for the count. Wood Duck and Wild Turkey were recorded for the 2nd time. New highs were set for Bald Eagle, Sharp-shinned Hawk, and N. Cardinal (5 of each). Ten White-throated Sparrows was also a new high. Overall the numbers recorded for several species were not impressive when compared to previous counts. Several species were significantly below their long-term averages. American Crows again totaled about a third of the number before West Nile Virus. Downy and Hairy Woodpeckers, White-breasted Nuthatch, and Black-capped Chickadee were also low in number. The total for House Sparrows (1247) is about a 1/3rd the number reported a few decades earlier. Compared with recent years, this was a low year for finding raptors in the prairie grasslands as only one Snowy Owl, one Roughlegged Hawk, one Red-tailed Hawk, and one Golden Eagle were found with two of these species not seen on count day.
