Weather: Temperature range: 9 to 20 deg F. Winds westerly, 3-10 mph. Some fog in AM, overcast rest of day. No precipitation. Snow depth 3-4 inches.

Conditions: Excellent crop of crabapples and mountain ash. Cone crop fair. Sunflowers and corn mostly harvested, but several fields not plowed under. Small patches of open water were present below the dams on the Red and Red Lake Rivers, Grand Forks lagoons, Crystal Sugar beet plant lagoons, and springs in Kellys Slough.

Comments:

The count was conducted under very good conditions with little wind and moderate temperatures. Most of the minimum-maintenance roads could be driven, which aided in finding open-country species. This was the 49th consecutive year for this count in its present location. Record high counts were recorded for Sharp-tailed Grouse, Short-eared Owl, and Red-winged Blackbird. A new species for the count was an immature Yellow-bellied Sapsucker spotted by Russ Wilber at his feeders on the last day of the count. This provides a rare winter record for North Dakota and photos will be submitted to the North Dakota Rare Birds Committee. Cooper's Hawk was reported for the second time, and Northern Saw-whet Owl and Bufflehead for the 3rd time. The saw-whet owl responded to recordings of the calls of this species. Despite considerable effort using recordings, an Eastern Screech-Owl could not be located. This is a species that used to be relatively easy to hear when weather conditions permitted.

This has not been a good year for irruption of northern finches. However a male White-winged Crossbill photographed by Tim Driscoll was a nice surprise.
