**Species Summary:** On Count Day, total of 44 species plus one race (Oregon Junco). There were 5 additional Count Week species giving a total of 49 species. Total number of individuals = 3648.

**Observers**: 25 observers in field in 12 parties (5 observers in 2 parties in MN, 20 observers in 10 parties in ND), plus 15 observers at feeding stations (3 in MN, 12 in ND).

**Effort:** 8:00 AM to 5:00 P.M. Total party-hours by Field Participants = 53.7 and total party miles = 635 ( 52.7 hours and 632 miles in cars, 1 hours and 2 miles on foot. One hour of nocturnal birding using playbacks for owls. A total of 57 hours was spent by feeder watchers.

**Weather:** Temperature range: -5 to 14 deg F. Winds southerly, 10-15 mph. Cloudy skies. Trace of snow. Still water frozen. There were areas of open water on Red River and Red Lake River, and Crystal Sugar lagoons in MN.

## **Comments:**

This was the 59<sup>th</sup> Grand Forks – East Grand Forks CBC. Forty-four species were found on Count Day, and an additional five species during Count Week, to give a total of 49.

Because of low temperatures and moderate winds counting was done from cars and at feeder stations. Above average snowfall to some extent prevented travel on minimum maintenance road. The 2019 CBC was preceded by heavy snow fall in early October and early December. A very wet fall prevented harvesting of crops. There were several fields of standing corn and at least one field of sunflowers within the count circle.

Changes in water management at the Grand Forks lagoons accounts for the lack of waterfowl there. A sizeable flock of Canada Goose at the Crystal Sugar ponds could not be found Count Day. Birds were very scarce in open country where several species were absent or seen in very low numbers. Snowy Owl was not recorded Count Day or Count Week for the first time in 50 years. Snow Buntings were scarce and there was only one Common Redpoll. Yet Pine Siskins were numerous at some but not all feeders. Northern Cardinal continues to increase with six being recorded at one feeding station. House Sparrows were seen at only six of 15 feeding stations.

Fox Sparrow was recorded for the 5<sup>th</sup> time. The same feeder (Mona and Harley Leake's) also had a Song Sparrow and a White-throated Sparrow. This is the same feeding station that had both Scarlet Tanager and Western Tanager in early November!
