The Count Overall

Time: 6 AM t0 5 PM

Weather: Temperature range: 12 to 24 deg F. Winds southerly, 21 mph in the morning and south-southwest at 12 mph at 5 pm. Cloudy sky. Snowpack up to 5 inches but ag fields in open country were nearly snow-free. Still water frozen. Open water below the dams on the Red River and Red Lake Rivers, and the Crystal Sugar lagoons in MN where warm water is discharged.

General Comments:

This was the 61st consecutive Grand Forks – East Grand Forks CBC conducted within the present circle located on U.S. 2, one mile east of the stoplight for the airport. The 56 species Count Day is the 3rd highest. Four additional species were recorded during Count Week. Numbers of the more commonly species seen on the count were within the normal range except for Dark-eyed Junco, which was almost double its previous high. Two immature Red-headed Woodpeckers in the Red River State Recreation Area provided a first for the count (Catherine Johnson, photos). A well-described male Yellow-bellied Sapsucker count week was the second record for this count (Isemingers). An American Wigeon at the Crystal Sugar ponds was also the second record for the count (DL and BK). Red-winged Blackbird was the only blackbird. There was only one American Goldfinch and just seven Pine Siskins.

Strong winds made finding birds in open country difficult. Despite the conditions, the entire Greenway south of downtown Grand Forks was walked by John Breker and Jodi Boe.
